GREETINGS FROM NEW BOARD MEMBER GREG HIGBY



It was quite a surprise when I was contacted by Alan Karass about serving on the ARS Board. I am only a high intermediate player without a serious music background. On the other hand, I have served as the executive director of a small not-for-profit organization, the American Institute of the History of Pharmacy, for 24 years. I imagine it was that organizational expertise that led to my nomination.

I first stumbled on the recorder about 35 years ago while home for Christmas break during college. My younger sister had been playing a soprano in school music class. I picked it up, and in a minute or two, was playing Beatles tunes by ear. This shocked me. I had been playing trombone since junior high and could play nothing by ear. (Still can't on the trombone.) As I've joked ever since, "I had music in my fingers, not my elbow!"

For next 25 years, I noodled away on occasion, playing favorite tunes by ear from classical or popular music. I taught myself to play printed music by working out fingerings while sitting at a piano with my trusty plastic soprano. As you can imagine, I came up with a few odd fingerings!

About eight years ago, I ran across a listing for an adult education course called "Early Music Collegium" here in Madison. I took my soprano recorder (the only one I knew existed!) to the first class. The course instructor welcomed me to the class and encouraged me to buy a tenor recorder. Her name was Lisette Kielson. After gaining experience and confidence in that class and others taught by Lisette, I began playing on Monday nights with the local chapter of ARS, The Winds of Southern Wisconsin.

Through the recorder, I was re-introduced to the world of early music. As a boy I sang three of the four parts of Handel's *Messiah* (STB) as my voice changed, and listened at length to a high school friend play Bach and Buxtehude. But I grew up a Beethoven addict and never explored pre-Classical-era music until Lisette's class.

I believe that ARS can serve a similar function for society at large—to expand the musical experiences of Americans via our special instrument. And I look forward to making this happen as an ARS Board member!

BOSTON EARLY MUSIC FESTIVAL PLANS

The ARS has continued planning events for the 2011 **Boston Early Music Festival**, set for **June 12-19** in Boston, MA.

Applications are being taken from professional recorder players to play on the **ARS Great Recorder Relay**, a series of performances on June 17. Audience members will want to plan to attend the free event and stay for the reception following, honoring Presidential Special Honor Award recipient **Louise Austin**. Later that afternoon, there will be an hourlong playing session open to everyone.

In addition, ARS will co-sponsor a performance by the Belgian recorder group **Ensemble Mezzaluna**. Directed by Peter Van Heyghen, the ensemble will present a concert entitled "The Instrumental Music of Ottaviano Petrucci, Venice (1501–1508)," with guest artist lutenist Paul O'Dette, at 12:30 p.m. June 19 at New England Conservatory's Jordan Hall. Van Heyghen will also present a master class on June 18.

A number of Festival events are planned, including concerts by The King's Singers and The Tallis Scholars, plus five offerings of *Niobe*, *Queen of Thebes*, with music by Agostino Steffani (1653–1728) and libretto by Luigi Orlandi, after Ovid's *Metamorphoses*. The opera's rich score, unusual for the period, features the Boston Early Music Festival Orchestra (augmenting its strings with winds including recorders to trumpets).

ARS 2012 FESTIVAL CALL FOR PROPOSALS!

The ARS is pleased to announce its 2012 Festival and Conference: "The Recorder Past Present and Future"

"The Recorder: Past, Present, and Future."

The event will be held July 5-8, 2012, at Reed College in Portland, OR. General festival information and session proposal applications are posted on the ARS web site, *www.americanrecorder.org*.

The ARS invites members of the recorder community to submit proposals for original topics. Each presenter is encouraged to propose 2-4 sessions, such as lectures, paper presentations, children's events, classes, themed playing sessions, mini-

workshops, roundtables, master classes and demonstrations. Successful applicants will be asked to present one original topic with two repeats (total of three presentations of the same session). Two original topics with one repeat will be considered if proposed.

Travel expenses not to exceed \$400 and an honorarium of \$410 will be provided to all full-time presenters. Presenters' room and board at Reed College will be included, as well as attendance at all other sessions at the festival.

Session proposals, not to exceed 300 words, with completed applications will be accepted via e-mail until **July 1**. Proposals will be reviewed by the ARS Festival and Conference Task Force, with notification by August 1. Time to Apply for Summer Scholarships If you plan to attend a summer workshop and are interested in applying for an ARS scholarship, be sure to submit your application no later than **April 15**.

The ARS awards scholarships of \$150-\$300 for summer workshops, and \$125 or less for weekend workshops, to deserving recorder students of all ages and ability levels. You need not provide proof of financial need.

Chapter Grant Deadline

May 15 is the deadline for Chapter Grants for any projects starting July 1 or later. The Chapter Grant Program is intended to help chapters initiate new projects or to expand existing projects by adding new features that the chapter may have difficulty financing itself. It is meant to provide aid for one-time chapter projects or "seed money" for projects that the chapter might continue to finance by other means. Preference is given for projects that:

- Show promise of increasing local and national membership
- Reach new audiences leading to greater diversity in ARS membership
- Provide special services (for example, to the elderly, to children, to beginners, to the visually-impaired, to the sick and disabled, to the economically impaired, etc.).

IN MEMORIAM

Beaugrand, Marsha J., Bend, OR, died 11/21/10 at age 62. Marsha liked quilting and playing recorders. Marsha joined the ARS in 2005.

Christensen, Janice, Newport, OR, died 12/6/10 at age 65 from natural causes. A staunch recorderist and participant in early music on the coast. Jan served for many years as a board member of the Midcoast Watersheds Council and the Lincoln County Library District; was an avid Master Gardener; and, with her late husband, at one time owned and operated a fishing vessel out of Newport. In 1992, she was the first to join the fledgling Oregon Coast Recorder Society and was also a member of its consort Lost in Time. She loved to cook and was the marvelous chef for lunches at the OCRS Winds and Waves Recorder Workshop. Jan joined the ARS in 1986. **Gardener, William G.**, Birch Bay, WA, died 1/26/11, at age 71 after a four-year battle with Lou Gehrig's disease. Bill taught literature and creative writing at Schome High School for 30 years. He loved sailing and playing the recorder. He was an early member of the Bellingham Recorder Society and White Rock recorder group. He started classes at his home for beginning and advanced players. He attended the Port Townsend workshops at Fort Worden, as well as Moss Bay play days. Bill joined the ARS in 1982.

Henretta, Susan, Raleigh, NC, died unexpectedly due to complications from back surgery 1/13/11 at age 64. She worked for decades as a computer programmer with the U.S. Postal Service. Susan had many hobbies and talents including knitting, crocheting, cross-stitching, square and line dancing, traveling, making music, and taking care of abandoned cats. Susan was a longtime member of Triangle Recorder Society and the ARS.

E-mail the basics: Date; Title of Event; Facility/City, Presenter(s)/Faculty–if a workshop, short description; and contact information to *editor@americanrecorder.org* (for *AR*) and *ars.recorder@americanrecorder.org* (the ARS office). **Newsletter/magazine deadlines**: six weeks (15th of second month) preceding issue date. Plan to announce events at least one month before they take place.

Digital photos of events should be at least 3"x4", and at least 300 dpi in a TIF or unedited JPEG format.
