SPRING MEETING OF THE ARS BOARD

The on-site arrangements, which were very favorable, were made by ARS Treasurer Ann Stickney of Seattle. Some of the main discussion points follow below.

The communication tools of the ARS are vital to its success. AR magazine has always been the main public face of the society, but in this electronic age the ARS web site and the ARS Facebook page are newly-important elements. Ways must be found to promote more active interaction of members with these electronic sites, and to strengthen the recorder community via communication and participation. The newly-redesigned web site will constantly change to encourage member visits. All members are urged to contribute to the web site and Facebook page to keep the sites fresh.

Negotiations are under way to post a complete set of Members' Library Editions, available for download on the web site, which will be a wonderful membership advantage.

tunities; receiving and responding to communications from group leaders; and providing assistance and advice. Group leaders should freely use the Liaisons to request information about ARS activities, programs and events; receive information, including pamphlets and forms; ask questions about the ARS; or request help.

The Chapter Liaisons are **Jennifer Carpenter** (CO), for chapters west of St. Croix/Mississippi River and Manitoba, CAN, westward; and Bonnie Kelly (MA), for chapters east of the St. Croix/Mississippi River and Ontario eastward (Minnesota and Louisiana are in the West). Matt Ross (CA) is the Liaison for all ARS recorder orchestras. All three are members of the ARS Board.

NOTICE TO PROFESSIONAL RECORDER PLAYERS

The **Sitka Center for Art and Ecology** in Otis, OR, offers a Recorder Residency program for professional recorder players. The dates for the 2015 Recorder Residency are **April 6- May 15, 2015**. Residencies are four to six weeks in length, with living space and a studio provided. Past residents have taught three-day workshops as part of the annual spring **Oregon Coast Recorder Society** (OCRS) **Workshop** at the Sitka Center, and have given concerts in the community.

The residency program was established by OCRS members, who raised \$103,000 to establish a recorder residency at Sitka in 2003.

CHARLES COLDWELL RECEIVES ARS PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT GRANT

The **ARS Professional Development Grant** was established in 2006 to help professional recorder players carry out special projects that will further their career and development as recorder players. **Charles Coldwell** received both the 2014 Sitka Recorder Residency and the 2014 ARS Professional Development Grant.

The grant is most often used to provide additional financial help to the recorder player awarded the Recorder Residency at the Sitka Center for Art and Ecology each year.

During his stay at Sitka during April, Coldwell planned to focus on arranging and editing music for solo recorder and recorder ensembles as well as to develop a program of music for solo recorder for performance. He also taught at the OCRS's Winds and Waves Workshop during his residency.

EDUCATIONAL OUTREACH GRANTS

The Educational Outreach budget of ARS was increased for this year by several generous donations in honor of the late Jeanne Lynch, a long-time ARS member and Board member who passed away last summer. Other grants were funded by the Recorder Teachers Fund and the Sondra Thompson Outreach Fund.

We are happy to announce the 2013-2014 Educational Outreach Grant recipients:

Peggy Turner of Ft. Worth, TX, support for the fourth annual Super Recorder Saturday, which took place on February 1, 2014. This program gives fourth and fifth grade students in the Ft. Worth Independent School District a cost-free day of recorder instruction, including a new soprano recorder and a music book. The program has drawn 55 to 85 students each year, and plays an important role in extending awareness of the instrument and its possibilities. (For a report, see the Spring 2014 *AR*.)

Jill Draffkorn of Harvard, IL, grant to implement the Recorder Karate program in her second grade classroom at St. Joseph's Catholic School during spring semester 2014. Students practice and improve their playing to earn "belts" in successive karate ranks.

Valerie Peters of Andover, MA, funds for the purchase and customizing of an alto recorder. Her right hand is atypical, and extra keywork will allow her to play the full range of the instrument as she works with her third and fourth grade students, as well as in her own performance.

Denise Dolan of St. Mary Magdalen School in Brentwood, MO, grant to purchase music stands for their music students at a school with a previously nonexistent music program.

Carolyn Kramkowski at Shaw VPA Elementary School in St. Louis, MO. For the fourth time in five years, the third grade recorder class will participate in Link Up!, an event where students perform with the St. Louis Symphony (*www.stlsymphony.org/communityeducation/ educationconcerts.aspx*). The award finances a bus to take students to and from Powell Symphony Hall. This valuable activity teaches students that the recorder is a serious instrument, and gives them a performance goal to work toward.

IN MEMORIAM

Barnhart, William, Nevada City, CA. Died 9/23/2013 at age 88. Bill developed an interest as a teen in electricity and ham radio. He served in World War II and received an engineering degree from Stanford University, then began his career in the television broadcasting industry in Los Angeles, CA. Bill founded Mid-Peninsula Recorder Orchestra in 1962 and was its first musical director. He was an accomplished musician, folk dancer and singer, having performed with Roger Wagner Chorale prior to moving to Nevada City in 1967. Bill was deeply involved in musical productions, instrumental and choral groups there as well. Bill joined the ARS in 1959.

Kime, Warren E., West Palm Beach, FL. Died 7/21/2013 at age 85. Warren grew up in New Hampton, IA. He studied trumpet with his father, Charles, and was presented as a child prodigy at 10 years old. He won many national music awards as a child. He was 11 when his father died, and he helped earn money for the family by playing in night clubs in nearby towns. Four years later Warren was drafted into the U.S. Army. He served in Europe during World War II and was part of the Glenn Miller Army Orchestra that started each radio broadcast with the phrase, "It's All Yours." He was again drafted for the Korean War in 1950, and became bandleader of the Special Services Show called "Take Ten" in Korea and Japan. He joined the Ralph Marterie Band in 1952 and also enrolled in the GI Plan at Northwestern University's music department. In 1953, he joined the CBS Studio Chesterfield Show in New York, and later he joined Cesar Patrillo's CBS Radio Program. He performed on many commercials and in jazz clubs with his Brass Impact Band, which also recorded several albums for Command Label; he also made albums of his own compositions. The ARS CD Club carried his *Recorder Jazz* for a number of years. Walter joined the ARS in 1994 and was a member of the New Cambrian Society Quintet.

Tyson, John Á., Lawndale, CA. Died 2/1/2014 of cancer at age 68. John was an early music enthusiast. He performed at Renaissance fairs and was a member of Bankside, La Mer Consort, and the Los Angeles Recorder Orchestra (LARO), for which he arranged numerous pieces. La Mer Consort and LARO dedicated their February concerts to his memory. John joined the ARS in 1994. (*To alleviate confusion, this is not John K. Tyson of Boston, MA.*)

Zuehlke , Elizabeth (Betty)Ann Pergande, Bellvue, CO. Died 3/28/2014 at age 99. Betty introduced the recorder and Early Music to hundreds of people throughout Southern California. She was instrumental in founding Orange County Recorder Society, Riverside Recorder Society, San Diego County Recorder Society and La Mer Consort, all of which continue to this day. She tirelessly taught recorder classes, often at little or no fee, wherever and whenever she could, to beginners and professionals alike, slowing down only in the final years of her life. Betty was an early music legend; she enriched the musical life of Southern California beyond measure. Betty joined the ARS in 1962.
