From Karel van Steenhoven: I used this well-known piece for [silver] flute to point out the differences between the flute and the recorder in a positive way--the different sound qualities, the possibilities and impossibilities of both instruments. Even with a growing number of keys, and a different overtone buildup, this Modern alto recorder still has the typical characteristics of the historical instruments: the ability to "speak" with great variety in expression, sometimes string-like, sometimes more like an oboe, sometimes like an organ or human voice (and yes, also sometimes like a flute). Also I recorded this flute composition to point out that a Modern recorder and a modern recorder player should be able to fit in under the conditions a modern wind instrument and a modern musician should be able to fulfill--but you need a good functioning contemporary recorder for that. I challenge anyone to play this piece musically on an recorder other than a Modern recorder.
