A CAPITAL BOARD MEETING

The ARS Board met at Cedar Lane Unitarian Universalist Church, Bethesda, MD, on September 13-16. The first order of business was to welcome recently elected Board members and then elect officers: Laura Kuhlman, president; Cynthia Shelmerdine, vice president; Tony Griffiths, secretary; Ann Stickney, treasurer; Jennifer Carpenter, assistant secretary; and Greg Higby, assistant treasurer. Valerie Austin is the new director at large.

Over the four days, important decisions were made to refocus the vision and work of the ARS; highlights follow.

The success of the 2012 ARS Festival in Portland, OR, was due in no small part to the active participation of our chapters and consorts. For that reason, we are excited to announce that a large portion of the Festival proceeds, together with support from the Daniel Morris Fund, will be used to create a fund devoted specifically to chapter grants. The Board decided also that the criteria for chapter grants will be changed and the purposes for which a chapter grant may be sought will be expanded.

In addition, festival proceeds, combined again with unrestricted money from the Daniel Morris Fund, will be used to overhaul and upgrade the ARS web site, pay off remaining debt, and create a cash reserve. These efforts place ARS in a stronger financial position and enhance member services.

ARS membership, although not at the heights of past years, has been in fairly healthy shape for several years. However, the Board wants to increase membership, through several initiatives. First, a new brochure is in the works. After that, a strengthened Membership Committee will focus on additional ways to retain members and attract new ones.

"ARS is 75" is an upcoming program that will help focus on and celebrate our 75th anniversary in 2014. Various initiatives are in the planning stages, including a commemorative album of music.

Several committees have been re-structured for more efficient operation. For example, Education is now a committee in its own right, as is Membership. A broadened committee now addresses the needs of Chapters, Consorts and Recorder Orchestras. The last will become official affiliated units within the ARS, in view of their growing popularity and importance in the recorder world.

The Board was hosted by the Washington (D.C.) ARS Chapter, who organized meals, accommodation, transport and a social evening with a playing session. The Board owes our hosts a great debt of gratitude for the excellent job they did.

2012 SUPER RECORDER SATURDAY III

Super Recorder Saturday, a recorder workshop for fourth and fifth grade music students in Ft. Worth, TX, has successfully completed its third year of existence—and for that we thank ARS. Without the continued financial support of the American Recorder Society this workshop—which is free to every student who attends—could not happen. So thank you very, very much, ARS, for your third year of support for Super Recorder Saturday.

I have learned so much in the last three years of putting on this event. I have learned that if you want organizational tasks done efficiently and quickly you only need to create a Teacher Steering Committee made up of music teachers. This year's five member committee—Jim Ekrut, Linda Schumaker, Carol July and Sara Montanez—prepared all year long for this event; it is their abilities to organize, streamline, and multitask that made sure everything was done well and in a timely manner.

I have learned that music teachers will give of their time and expertise to teach recorder workshops even if they have to be at school again at 7:30 a.m. on a Saturday morning.

I have learned that fourth and fifth grade students in Ft. Worth public schools are learning a *lot* in their music classrooms. They come ready to play the recorder all day, and the recorder skills they bring with them help to create some great achievements in the workshops and also in the program they give at the end of the day for parents.

I have learned that support for the arts is strong in the Ft. Worth community. The principal, Ms. Cortez, of the school where I teach, Oakhurst Elementary, continues to have her school host this event and opens up our classrooms and cafeteria on a Saturday morning, provides the support staff necessary, and welcomes students from across the district. Volunteers from the local chapter

of Sigma Alpha Iota, a music fraternity, have come for the last three years to provide help with the registration and lunchtime activities.

I have learned that local businesses



and organizations want to support the students in our community and are willing to donate services, musical instruments and books, and financial support to open up a greater world of opportunity for those students. CiCi's Pizza, Rhythm Band, Inc., Sweet Pipes, and Sigma Alpha Iota have all been faithful and muchappreciated donors.

GREETINGS FROM NEW ARS BOARD MEMBER TONY GRIFFITHS, RECORDER FANATIC

I grew up in the UK, where almost all kids learn the recorder in school. Unfortunately (as in my case), it usually doesn't stick.



Much later, one of my daughters wanted to be part of an extra-curricular recorder ensemble at school, so I bought some plastic recorders. To encourage her, I started playing with her. I joined the British Columbia Recorder Society (now an ARS chapter) and attended their monthly group plays and workshops. I became entranced by the repertoire we played, mostly early music, and I still cannot get enough of it.

I am forever grateful to the recorder for opening up that world to me. Now that I have retired from being a scientist, I spend a large portion of my time on the recorder and its music. I have acquired many recorders of various sizes and types. I play in a small consort, and we perform for charities once or twice a year.

One of my great pleasures is attending regional workshops, mostly on the west coast of the U.S., where I have met some wonderful instructors and friends who have introduced me to many good things, including the ARS. I agreed to run for the ARS Board because, since I get so much satisfaction from the recorder, I believe there must be thousands more people out there who would benefit from it as I do—and my mission is to try to reach that target audience.

SCHOLARSHIP THANKS

Edited from a letter to the ARS Board and the ARS Scholarship Committee

Thank you for awarding me the tuition scholarship to attend the American Recorder Society 2012 Festival held at Reed College in Portland, OR, during July 2012. It was a rewarding experience and one that has inspired new vision for my teaching as well as my playing.

I was able to network with many recorder teachers from across the U.S. I am now in touch with several other teachers who use the same programs at their elementary schools; we are currently sharing information about how we use those methodologies and resources as we look to expand our recorder programs. Nina Stern's class on "Recorders Without Borders" was an excellent resource. Anne Timberlake's session, "This is your body on music: Anatomy and physiology for recorder players," was excellent. Anne's expertise as a Speech and Language Specialist was a perfect fit for recorder players, and her information was perhaps the most valuable of all of my classes for me both personally and professionally. Her PowerPoint was specific and interesting, her lecture was pleasant and informative, and her illustrations and active demonstrations made the information personal and relevant.

I have brought home new information for my students at school (all 250 budding recorder players in 3rd-5th grades) and for my private students as well (both children and adults). I came back with renewed excitement about my instrument and the music I love so much. Your generous scholarship allowed me to attend this Festival and I am so grateful to the ARS for your support. I know the new knowledge and excitement that I have brought home with me will be put to good use in my community.

I felt moved at the end of the weekend to become an ARS member—something I have not considered previously since we do not have a chapter in Bellingham and Seattle is 85 miles away. I look forward to reading the journal and staying abreast of national as well as local concerns.
