We want to ensure that what we offer is in service of our members.

Are you aware of the **Recorder Music Center (RMC)**, housed at Regis University in Denver, CO? We met with former Board member Mark Davenport, who created the RMC in 2005. It now houses over 18,000 music

scores for recorders, the ARS archives, instruments, and other important documents pertaining to recorders. Please visit *www.regis.edu/recorder* to learn about the RMC. The ARS Board is exploring ways to better bring this resource to you. Also see the article in this *AR* about a recent donation of a collection of folk flutes.

The Communications committee continues to update the ARS web site, to give you even more resources available through it! 2018 CHANGES IN ARS SCHOLARSHIP AND GRANT APPLICATION DEADLINES

To give recipients more time to plan, and to better accommodate our all-volunteer approval committee, some of our scholarship and grant application due dates have been changed. **Deadlines are:**

- Traveling Teacher Program: March 1, for funds to be used after September 1
- Week-long Workshop Scholarships (usually for summer workshops): March 31
- Chapter Grants: May 15 for projects beginning after September 1

As a reminder, here are some due dates that have not changed:

- Educational Outreach Grants: application period is still May 1- June 15 for projects to be funded in the fall of the same calendar year
- Professional Development Grant: September 15 of the year preceding the proposed residency or project

Weekend scholarships are awarded year-round and should be applied for at least two months before the event for which funding is being requested.

Any ARS member in good standing may apply for a scholarship or grant (except Educational Outreach Grants, which do not require ARS membership). Recipients are required to write a report within four weeks of the event describing their experience; this ensures that ARS donors can learn how their funds were used.

IN MEMORIAM

Emptage, Michael Rollins, age 77, of Loveland, CO, passed away on May 5, 2017. A Harvard-trained chemist and an accomplished statistician, Michael lived abroad and traveled extensively, and had a busy life of many hobbies, including nature photography, classical music, and model train building. Michael was a former Treasurer for the Fort Collins (CO) chapter. He and his wife Cathy, also an ARS member, served in various positions with the Triangle (NC) Recorder Society before retiring to Colorado. Michael also wrote Music Reviews and various concert reports over the years for *American Recorder*. He and Cathy both became ARS members in 1993.



Ettinghausen, Elizabeth S. died in Princeton, NJ, on June 12, 2016, weeks short of her 98th birthday. A scholar of early Christian, Byzantine and Islamic art, she had lived in Washington, D.C., and its Virginia suburbs from 1943 until 1967, when she moved to Princeton. Born in Vienna, Austria, in 1918 and growing up in a medical family, she studied at the University of Vienna. With the rise of the Nazis, she and her family fled to Turkey where, at the University of Istanbul, she finished her Ph.D. in Early Christian and Byzantine art in 1943. That same year she and her family immigrated by convoy to the U.S. She became a fellow at Harvard's Dumbarton Oaks (Washington, D.C.), where she examined the Byzantine architecture of Constantinople, focusing on glazed tiles. At Dumbarton Oaks, she met and

in 1945 married Dr. Richard Ettinghausen, of the Smithsonian Institution and later Consultative Chairman of Islamic art at the Metropolitan Museum of Art (New York City, NY) and a professor of Islamic art at New York University's Institute of Fine Arts. Throughout her life, she enjoyed her many friends around the world, interacting with all through her fluency in English, German, French, Turkish and Persian or by her knowledge of a few phrases in many other languages. Her conversations, usually centering on art, music or current events, were graced with her sense of humor and often her critique or her advice on the topic at hand. For many years, she was a docent at the Princeton University Art Museum and a member of the Princeton chapter of the American Recorder Society. She had been a member of ARS since 1967.

Mirando, Jacqueline J., a lifelong Rockland, NY, resident, died October 25, 2016. Jackie was born July 25, 1946, in Suffern, NY. She worked as a music teacher for North Rockland School District in Stony Point for 30 years, and was active in the Rockland Center for the Arts in West Nyack. Jackie started out as a new recorder player in the Westchester Recorder Guild (WRG), but eventually improved, purchasing and playing the big recorders so her groups could play at 8-foot pitch. She joined a number of nearby recorder groups in addition to WRG, such as Recorder Orchestra of New York and Rockland Recorder Society, serving the latter as chapter representative. Many of her retirement activities were recorder-related. She joined ARS in 2001.



Paschal, Mary Lou, 82, died on May 7, 2017, in Charlotte, NC. She had been a member of ARS since 2001 and founded the ARS-affiliated Central Piedmont Community College Early Music Consort in the 1980s. She received her Bachelor of Music degree from Oberlin College Conservatory of Music, and Master of Music from The University of Mississippi, with further graduate studies at Winthrop and Harvard Universities. In addition to work as a choir director and organist, she was a full-time music instructor at Central Piedmont Community College. While at CPCC, she founded the Early Music Program and co-directed the recorder ensemble until her death. She played numerous instruments and had a large collection, particularly of recorders, harps and viols, many of which she

happily loaned to budding players so they could join the ensemble. She performed in the continental U.S., Europe, Hawaii, Malaysia, Philippines, Singapore, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Australia and New Zealand on tour with her niece, flutist Teresa Beaman. She also recorded two CDs, *Flute Flora* and favorite American folk songs, *Down In the Valley*. She played music up to the end of her life, performing only a few weeks before she entered hospice.





"AMERICAN RECORDER RALLY" IS ON!

Recorder virtuoso Matthias Maute (right, photo by Bill Blackstock) from Montréal, QC, is bringing an exciting new project to the U.S. in spring 2018: the great "American Recorder Rally."

Working with up to 12 ARS Recorder Orchestras and Chapters around the continent, Maute has created a large-scale



concert program. The project, sponsored in part by the American Recorder Society, is designed to give players of intermediate level and above an opportunity to perform with a professional musician and conductor.

Maute will direct participants in a two-hour rehearsal, with a performance the same day. The concert selections will be mostly solo works performed by Maute on recorder and traverso, and include pieces with recorder orchestra. The *pièce de résistance* will be an original concerto he has composed specifically for this project.

As of this writing the "Rallies" are scheduled on the west coast for **Portland**, **OR** (March 8, 2018) and **Seattle**, **WA** (March 10). Maute will contact ARS Recorder Orchestra and Chapter leadership directly with invitations to participate in the rally.

THE FALL AND RISE OF THE NEW YORK RECORDER GUILD

After nearly 10 years of dormancy, the **New York Recorder Guild** (NYRG) is back in business. This is hardly earthshaking news, but New York City's recorder players think it's a big deal.

The Guild was incorporated in 1975. Its purpose was simple: bring players and teachers together. In the 1970s and early '80s, classes were offered on three or four levels from low intermediate to advanced. Meetings were dirt cheap—50 cents in the mid-'70s—and teachers worked for free. They would reap the benefits later, when students started coming to them for small-group coaching and private lessons.

The '80s and early '90s were a golden age. Thanks to executive director Mordecai Rubin, the Guild got free space at Columbia Teachers College for monthly meetings. (Rubin chaired the Spanish department and had some pull.) The gifted and energetic Andrew Acs founded the New York Recorder Guild School to offer specialty classes in addition to the monthly gatherings. There were talent shows, instrument auctions, afternoon workshops in members' homes, a Consort Finder service and hikes-cum-playing-sessions led by outdoorsman Bruce Larkin.

And there was the monthly *Newsletter*. It was started in the 1970s by Susan Snyder and Dek Stump, whose marriage was announced, years later, on the front page. News of NYRG activities always appeared on page one. Rubin and his successor, Michael Zumoff, insisted on that.

But Snyder and her successor, Eleanor Brodkin, were early music devotees who thought a newsletter should include a lot more. Issues were eight to 12 pages. Each one had a two- or three-page listing of early music concerts around town. Snyder and Brodkin solicited reviews of concerts, books and new music from the likes of Paul Echols, Philip Levin, John Collis, Lucy Cross, Wendy Powers, Sheila Schoenbrun, Judith Davidoff and Gene Reichenthal.

In 1992, the Guild board decided that the *Newsletter* needed a new look. Eleanor Brodkin, editor from the mid-1980s, had produced it on a typewriter; the time had come to go electronic. By 1997 the editor was Lucille Goeres, a modern flute player who knew word processing. Brodkin's tenure was the high point of *Newsletter* content, but the publication looked its best when Goeres was producing it.

Unfortunately, by then the NYRG had fallen on hard times. It had succeeded all too well in its purpose. By the late '90s, most amateurs had found groups and teachers. Few needed the Guild as they once had.

The school, the auctions, the talent shows and the musical hikes had vanished. Monthly meetings still took place at

Teachers College, but because attendance was dwindling, only one level was offered. In 1999, co-music director Susan Iadone replaced meetings with a series of miniworkshops to be held in members' living rooms.

A few years earlier, music director John DeLucia had started a recorder orchestra. This drew crowds for a while, but by 2003 it had been re-named a "large ensemble playing session" and was indistinguishable from the old monthly meetings.

The most lasting innovation, launched in 1989, was the Spring Festival. Hosted by the ever-hospitable Teachers College, each Festival had an interesting theme, four levels of classes, lunch catered by the College, and a music-and-instrument store run by Richie and Elaine Henzler of Courtly Music Unlimited. The Festival continued until 2007. By then it was the only activity the Guild still offered.

Two years earlier, the Guild had published its last hard-copy *Newsletter*. Those who insisted could still get an unformatted paper copy. Everybody else got the publication by e-mail. Lucille Goeres resigned as editor in September 2005; after that the *Newsletter*, while still informative, looked a lot less professional.

In 2006, after 26 years at the helm, Michael Zumoff resigned as executive director. He was replaced by the team of Susan Iadone, Larry Lipnik and the late John DeLucia, who asked the membership what it would like the NYRG to do.

Not much, apparently. After a few workshops, the Guild went "on hiatus," as Iadone put it.

Gotterdammerung ends, as you know, with Valhalla and all the gods burning up. But the last music you hear is a yearning, faintly optimistic strain that hints of rebirth. We in New York heard that music this spring when a few people—notably professionals **Wendy Powers** and **Deborah Booth** and amateur **Natalie Lebert**—decided that the New York Recorder Guild should rise again. As of this writing, we have a board, a web site designer, a database maven and a music director.

Chapter Tidbits

As the end of each chapter's playing year approaches, special events like workshops or play days are set by some chapters. Moss Bay Recorder Society hosted its annual Moss Bay Meet on April 29 in Kirkland, WA. The full day included three playing sessions led by coaches Larry Stark, Miyo Aoki and Sally Mitchell.

Orange County Recorder Society had its Second Annual **BYOB** (Bring Your Own Band) night, at which six groups or individuals showcased what they do outside of the monthly meetings.

"Neither snow nor...": make that three feet of snow—on May 19—which affected travel to Estes Park, CO, but didn't prevent the Denver Recorder Society's biennial "Springtime in the Rockies" workshop from being held, regardless of the nature of the Springtime. While crews cleared the roads, workshop organizer Sharon Bolles compressed the schedule so that everyone arrived a day late on Saturday and all sessions were held. Faculty included guest John Tyson (who flew in from Boston, MA, before the storm), Mark Davenport and Jennifer Carpenter. Davenport hosted a Friday afternoon playing session at Regis University in Denver to replace what would have been an opening Big Bash.

Philadelphia (PA) Recorder Society members had a Consort Day on June 17, followed by large group playing of popular American music. The playlist (all SATB) included: Happy Days Are Here Again (1929), Milton Ager; Puttin' On The Ritz (1929), Irving Berlin; Chattanooga Choo Choo (1941), Harry Warren; Let Me Call You Sweetheart (1910), Leo Friedman; Daisy Bell: A Bicycle Built For Two (1892), Harry Dacre.

On July 8, 30 Philadelphia (PRS) players gave a half-hour concert for residents of Cathedral Village, where the chapter meets. For a recording of the performance, visit https://philadelphiarecordersociety.org/recordings. PRS member and secretary Perry Watts wrote: "Residents came up to me afterwards and said how much they enjoyed the program, and that we <code>must</code> do it again next year." The chapter has already scheduled a repeat for next May.

When PRS gathered again in the fall, the opening piece was Fallen Leaves Fugal Fantasy (2007) by Dominic Bohbot,

an ARS *Members' Library* Edition. The rest of the program included fugues, canons and canzonas by Guillaume de Machaut, J.S. Bach, Johann Pachelbel, William Brade, Giovanni Maria Trabaci, and a blues canon, *Groove Marie Groove* (2009) by Uwe Heger

The first meeting of the **Tucson (AZ) Recorder Society** (TRS) season started with a member performance organized and led by TRS librarian **Brian Cochran** (playing drum)—seven members offered William Byrd's *Earle of Oxford's Marche*, including lively divisions on recorder and bass viol.

The fall concert of the **Colorado Recorder Orchestra** (CRO), led by **Rosi Terada**, expanded its players to combine with a small viol consort. Project Loiv, directed by **Ann Marie Morgan**, joined CRO for "A Baroque Potpourri."

The Fourth Farewell, a concert on August 26, featured Isabella Pagel and Carolyn Lober, who have played together for the past 10 years and now have parted ways to head off on separate adventures. They were joined by Kate Faber and



their teacher **Vicki Boeckman** (quartet photo, above).

Seattle Recorder Society also had a visitor for its opening fall meeting: Jeffrey Cohan demonstrated transverse flutes from the Renaissance (descant, tenor, bass and great bass); Baroque one-keyed flutes by Hotteterre, Quantz and Rottenburgh; Classical period flutes with eight keys by Richard Potter (1785), Grenser (a copy of an instrument from about 1807) and Rudall (1820); an "old-system" flute from the turn of the 20th century; and the modern flute. The copies were by Rudolf Tutz, Friedrich von Huene, Filadelfio Puglisi, Barbara Stanley and Peter Noy.

TRAVELING TEACHER PROGRAM A SUCCESS IN MIAMI, FL

We were pleased to be part of the ARS **Traveling Teacher Program (TTP)** in early 2017. Our chosen teacher was **Anne Timberlake**. The ARS plan was well thought out; we planned rather carefully; and weather-wise the timing was good for Miami, FL. However, airfares are always high at that time

The **Miami Chapter** shared the TTP with players from the Palm Beach area, some of whom are members of the **Palm Beach Chapter**. Since both towns are connected by an hour train ride, the whole program was quite efficient.

Anne Timberlake turned out to be a great choice for our circumstances. She adapted so well to our travel needs and was very flexible. We really appreciated her taking extra early morning flights and using our public Tri-Rail and Metro Systems. In general, she would fly to Fort Lauderdale, teach lessons at the home of Beverly Lomer on Friday, spend the night with Beverly's family, then take the Tri-Rail train to Miami in time for Saturday lunch and to stay at Gisela Haynes's home. She conducted our Saturday two-hour chapter meetings at the nearby Friends Meeting House.

On Sunday we had a schedule for her to give lessons to Miami members at Gisela's home. Then she would take the Metro to Miami International Airport to return home to St. Louis, MO. She saved us time and money by cheerfully

agreeing to these travel arrangements.

We were especially fortunate to have Anne conduct our monthly Miami ARS chapter meetings for all three months of January, February and March 2017. Since we do not have a local teacher or conductor, it was valuable for us in the chapter meeting to have Anne help us to make our playing more musical. She addressed us as a group and also individually to help with tonguing, breathing, relaxing, phrasing—and took the time and patience to help us develop as an ensemble musically. She chose appropriate music for the various levels of our players. She was an excellent teacher and a good fit for our players.

We were able to schedule and to complete, each month, individual and ensemble lessons for 11 participants, as well as enabling us to feature enhanced chapter meetings for our Miami members. Players were grateful for this opportunity

to study with a professional teacher.

All scheduled classes took place, with no cancellations. Responses from each participant showed gratitude and enthusiasm. Some expressed a desire to do it again! Here are responses from a few individual participants:

"I live in Miami and enjoyed hosting the classes and the teacher at my house, since I have the space and the location is close to the Metro Rail and rather central for all participants. My experience with the TTP is very positive; and since we do not have a recorder teacher in town it was very helpful and motivating to my overall joy in playing the recorder. The spacing of the event over three months worked well; it gave me time to practice between the visits and I got feedback after the first month and at the end of the third session I noticed improvement of my playing."

"For me, the Traveling Teacher experience was totally positive. Anne conducted the chapter meetings in a very organized manner, with specific goals in mind, which were clearly expressed to us. Also, her manner was very encouraging and never negative. I believe even beginning level players felt comfortable and not intimidated.

The same positive, encouraging manner was apparent in the individual lessons. Anne quickly seemed able to assess strengths and weaknesses, and to offer constructive suggestions for improving areas where problems existed.
